There I learned that Kibataro Oki himself once owned that same machine and later donated it to the Ministry of Communications. As I paused to look closely at that simple machine, I felt some of the excitement, even passion, Kibataro Oki must have felt when he started out in the communications industry in the 1880s. In considering Oki Electric's progressive spirit over the 120year history brought together in this book, And it goes on about the company...

A little bit of history

OKI celebrated the 120th anniversary of foundation in November, 2001 and published the History book "The 120-Year History of Oki Electric."

With his enterprising spirit, Kibataro Oki (1848-1906) was far ahead of his time in the late 1800s. In January 1881, convinced that the nation was about to enter the age of communications, he founded Meikosha, the origins of today's OKI:

*1874 . Kibataro Oki enters **Telegraph** Bureau's School of Technology

1881 Kibataro Oki establishes Meikosha, Ltd.,

1889 Changes Meikosha's name to Oki Electric Works
